What Is 4-H?

“The mission of 4-H is to develop youth and the adults working with those youth to realize their full potential-becoming effective, contributing citizens through participation in research-based, informal, hands-on educational experiences.”



In Warren County, most 4-H'ers belong to a community club where they elect officers, learn to conduct meetings, choose a 4-H project to complete, plan programs and participate in community service and other activities. A network of adult volunteers work with the 4-H clubs. Parents are welcome to volunteer their time and talents.

4-H Symbols

Every 4-H member and leader should be familiar with the 4-H emblem, motto, and pledge. These symbols express the spirit and ideals of the 4-H organization.

For my club, my community, my country and my world.”*

Motto

The 4-H motto, *“To Make The Best Better,”* should be the aim of every 4-H member and leader.

Emblem

The 4-H emblem is a four-leaf clover with the letter H on each leaf. The four H's represent the four-fold development of head, heart, hands, and health. (Note: The 4-H Symbol is protected under a U.S. copyright- 18 USC 707)
